A. HMCI proposes changes to Ofsted inspections

Sir Michael Wilshaw, Her Majesty's Chief Inspector (HMCI), announced proposed changes to the Ofsted inspection framework at the Association of School and College Leaders' conference on 21 March. The changes would reduce the number of inspections for 'good' schools; they will be inspected once every two years for one day in a 'light touch' inspection. He explained: 'Only when inspectors see steep decline in a good school or, conversely, great improvement, that a fill inspection will be triggered...Even if the HMI does see some problems in a school, a full inspection may not be required – as long as school leaders are tackling problems effectively and have the capacity to improve the school.'

Speaking on Radio 4, HMCI said 'There is little point in school inspectors turning up once every four or five years to confirm what a good school already knows and what the data already says. We would much rather use inspection resources – particularly HMI resources – in schools that require stronger intervention; in schools that are in 'special measures' or that 'require improvement.' As he has stated previously, Sir Michael reiterated that he is keen to ensure more inspectors are directly employed by Ofsted.

These changes will be subject to consultation with the Secretary of State for Education, Michael Gove.

B. Education news

1. Fairer Funding Consultation

We have been awaiting the promised publication of the consultation on a new National Funding Formula (NFF) since before Christmas. However, on 13 March David Laws, the Minister of State for Schools, in a statement to Parliament announced both that there would be no NFF before the next Parliament and that there would be some extra money for the 'least fairly funded authorities' from April 2015. An extra £350m has been allocated and will awarded to authorities by first determining a minimum funding level based on five pupil characteristics and two school characteristics – if a local authority's funding level is below this minimum level it will receive additional funding – if it is not it won't. 2. Ofsted Data Dashboards updated

The Ofsted School Data Dashboards for key stages 1 and 2 have been updated with 2013 results. For key stage 4, the Ofsted Dashboard will be updated later this month. The Ofsted Dashboard gives an overview of a school's performance, and compares it to similar schools, which is particularly helpful. However, governors will need to look at more detailed data to effectively monitor school performance, and the Ofsted Dashboard should only be used as a starting point.

3. Urgent action needed for secondary school places

The Local Government Association (LGA) has warned that despite local councils taking action to increase the number of secondary school places, more still needs to be done in order to avoid a potential shortfall within the next five years. Analysis by the LGA of the DfE's data suggests that 80,716 additional places will be needed by 2019/2020, covering a third of local authority (LA) areas. Although £2.35bn funding was announced in December to fund additional places up to 2017, LAs are still struggling to afford additional places, or indeed find land to house new schools.

The LGA is calling for LAs to be given indicative five year capital budgets to better enable them to plan ahead (something NGA would support); given a greater say in the establishment of new schools, particularly the choice of academy provider, and to be given a greater role in judging and approving free school applications.

The report also sets out the range of measures LAs have used to meet the need so far including borrowing extra money, adding an extra class to a different school each year to reduce the burden and extensive use of temporary accommodation.

4. Primary and 16 to 19 assessment and accountability

The government has announced changes to assessment and accountability regime in primary phase and the accountability regime for post-16 providers. Both changes were the subject of individual consultations last year.

For primary schools, new more challenging Key Stage 2 (KS2) tests will be introduced with 85% of pupils expected to reach the set standard equivalent to level 4b of the existing tests. This will be accompanied by a new floor standard. A new baseline test will also be introduced in reception against which future progress will be measured.

At 16-19 a new accountability system will be introduced including published minimum standards and headline measures.

C. Parliamentary news

1. All party parliamentary group on education governance and leadership

The All Party Parliamentary Group on Education Governance and Leadership, for which NGA provides the secretariat, met in the House of Commons on 17 March. The event featured a keynote speech from Lord Nash, the Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State for Schools, the minister responsible for governance. He discussed the theme: 'the importance of volunteering as a school governor.'

The NGA is working with the Education and Employers taskforce, SGOSS, the Confederation for British Industry, the National Coordinators of Governor Services and the Department for Education (DfE) to encourage more people to volunteer as school governors.

Speaking at the event, Professor Chris James from the University of Bath said: 'The governing environment is a thoroughly enjoyable one as well as being challenging. People learn new skills to then take back into the workplace. This can be a virtuous cycle.'

NGA is working with Professor James on a major survey into the state of governance in England's schools, with the NGA - you can take the survey here. There are only 10 days to go: the survey closes on 14 April. Last time such a survey was carried out 5,000 governors responded and we would like to reach that, so please distribute the link widely.


