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A. Updated "Keeping children safe in education" guidance

The Department for Education (DfE) has published <u>updated statutory guidance</u> for governing bodies both of LA maintained schools and academies, which replaces '*safeguarding children and safer recruitment in education*' from 2006. The new guidance is less extensive than previously, but is more detailed than the draft guidance. In addition, it includes information on safer recruitment, what staff should know and do, different types of safeguarding issues, and dealing with allegations against staff. It also recommends that governing bodies consider how children may be taught about safeguarding as part of the curriculum.

One of the main changes is that although governing bodies (of LA maintained schools) must still ensure that at least one member of a recruitment panel has undertaken safer recruitment training, this training will no longer be subject to approval by the Secretary of State. The training should be 'appropriate' and should as a minimum cover the contents of the guidance document. The guidance also suggests that schools may want to seek advice on training from their Local Safeguarding Children Board (LSCB). NGA has raised the possible quality assurance issues of non-approved training with the DfE, and in undertaking training, governing bodies should assure themselves that the training provider has a track-record in providing relevant training.

The statutory guidance also states that school and college governors should be treated in the same way as other volunteers and that DBS checks should only be requested if they undertake 'regulated activity,' which in most cases will not be the case. The guidance does make clear that governing bodies and proprietors can request enhanced DBS checks as part of the recruitment process. Academies/free schools should check their articles of association as in a number of cases these require DBS checks to be undertaken. 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B. Education news

1. Special school data dashboard released

Ofsted has released a new data dashboard for special schools. For special schools that have pupils working at National Curriculum level, the mainstream School Data Dashboard measures are shown. Where pupils are operating below the national curriculum, this is on performance scales, additional measures are displayed for the attainment and progress of these pupils. Data has been released for key stages one, two and four.

3. David Blunkett publishes Labour's Policy Review into education structures

Last week, David Blunkett MP, the former Secretary of State for Education and Employment, published his report that makes recommendations for the Labour party's policy in relation to the education system after the next election. The report specifically looks at the framework and structures of the education system rather than details of /curriculum and qualifications. In particular, the report looks at the accountability structures at what has become known as the 'middle tier' level. The report states that the challenge is to provide 'sufficient autonomy to be able to drive standards from within the school, whilst at the same time providing accountability to protect the interests of pupils and safeguard the investment of public resources."

In relation to governance, the document recognises the challenge inherent in being a governor or trustee, and recommends that more support and training be provided. The document also says that a Labour government would work with the National Governors' Association to ensure that best practice on governance is identified, developed and disseminated to governors/trustees.

4. Pupil Premium awards

The Deputy Prime Minister, Nick Clegg, and the Schools Minister, David Laws, announced the 2015 and 2016 Pupil Premium Awards yesterday. These will be an opportunity to showcase innovative and effective practice and to give public recognition to schools that are excelling in raising the attainment of disadvantaged pupils. Up to 500 schools will receive prizes. There will be a top prize of £250,000 for secondary schools and £100,000 for primary and special schools. Large regional prizes of up to £100,000 will also be awarded to schools across the country, alongside hundreds of smaller qualifier awards – so schools will have a good chance of being recognised with a prize.



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They are changing how schools will be assessed to reflect the fact that we want to reward sustained improvement over time in raising attainment of disadvantaged pupils. To win the larger prizes, schools will need to provide evidence of implementing effective strategies to improve achievement.

D. Improving practice

1. Improving science and maths in your secondary school

2. Partnership working between small, rural primaries

CfBT, an education charity, has <u>published findings</u> from a research project into partnerships in small rural schools in Lincolnshire, where the County Council has taken a strategic approach. A variety of partnership arrangements were in use, most informal, and the report measured the effect of this on school improvement. Performance of these schools has increased significantly since the approach began in 2012, and repots from Ofsted, governors and headteachers have suggested that the partnership was a crucial contributory factor. The work corroborates the NGA's own research: <u>The road to federation</u>.
