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A. New FFT Primary Governor Data Dashboard

The latest Fischer Family Trust (FFT) Governor Dashboard for primary schools is now available. This updated version contains 2013 key stage 2 results, improved gauges, and new Department for Education indicators. The FFT Governor Dashboard helps school governors hold schools to account, support and challenge the leadership team, and make more informed strategic decisions. It is essential reading for all governors.



The updated secondary dashboard will be available in mid-October.

B. Education News

1. Government responds on the role of school governing bodies

On Friday 13 September, the government released its response to the House of Commons Education Select Committee inquiry on the Role of School Governing Bodies. In July, the Select Committee made 23 recommendations to the government in regards to governance. You can read the full summary on the NGA news page.

2. A shortage of primary places

Analysis from the Local Government Association (LGA), which represents more than 370 councils in England and Wales, shows that as many as two in three councils in England could see more children looking to start primary school in their area by September 2016 than there are places for. According to the LGA, Central Bedfordshire, Croydon, Bedford, Waltham Forest, Newham and Hounslow Councils will see the biggest demand for primary places, with the need to increase school capacity by 25 per cent or more by the start of the 2016 school year. Peterborough, Redbridge, Ealing, Bristol, Lewisham, Slough, Maidenhead, Sutton, and Barking and Dagenham will have to increase the number of school places by at least 20% by 2016/17 to ensure every child gets a place.

This has led to suggestions in some quarters that schools will need to operate 'split shifts' in order to accommodate the increase in pupils.

London Councils' latest analysis indicates that a further 83,470 school places are needed between 2014 and 2017, the equivalent to 199 new primary schools or 80 new secondary schools. The analysis suggests that the funding received from central Government will be insufficient to meet the need for extra places – with London boroughs a funding shortfall needing to contribute around £9,000 per pupil towards the costs of building pupil places locally.

At the same time the Government announced the opening of 93 new free schools, not all of which are in areas with a shortage of school places.

3. MPs to Debate School Governance

On Tuesday 8 October at 12:30 there will be a debate on school governors and school improvement, in Westminster Hall, in the House of Commons. Please e-mail your MP urging him/her to attend the debate, stressing the importance of school governance. You will find email addresses on Parliament UK website, and remember to include your postal address (and/or that of the school) in the email to show you are a constituent.

If you copy Philip Wood into the email, he will make sure your MP receives a briefing before the debate. This is a great opportunity to raise the profile of governors and for us to provide some evidence of what is being done to improve governance up and down the country.

4. Students to study maths and English to 18

From this term, students who have not achieved a C or better in GCSE maths or English will have to study both subjects post-16. The government has said it would prefer these students to continue studying GCSEs, but they may take other qualifications – including functional skills and free-standing mathematics qualifications accredited by Ofqual – as a stepping stone to GCSE



study. Governors at schools with sixth forms will need to consider the implications of the changes on their staffing arrangements, in particular whether additional English and maths teachers will need to be employed.

5. Ofqual announces changes to exam reform timetable

On 6 September Ofqual announced that new GCSEs in the sciences, history, geography and modern languages will be delayed until 2016. The Department for Education (DfE) initially wanted these to be made ready for first teaching in 2015, but in a letter to the Secretary of State, Michael Gove, Ofqual Chief Executive Glenys Stacey said she cannot be confident that high quality qualifications in all subjects will be ready by then. She said that temporary changes Ofqual has made to science, history and geography makes them less of a concern, and therefore maths, English language and English literature will be prioritised. The regulator still aims to make these subjects ready for first teaching in 2015.


On 12 September the government announced proposals to reform performance tables for 16-19 education. It intends the new tables to include more information about vocational courses and will show where sixth forms and colleges have failed to ensure all their students have achieved C grades in GCSE maths and English. The DfE believes these changes will raise standards. It has launched a <u>consultation</u> on the proposals, to which NGA will be responding. Send your comments to Ellie.
