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A. Education Select Committee Inquiry into Governance

The House of Commons Education Select Committee has announced an inquiry into the role of governing bodies. The Select Committee wishes to receive written evidence from as many governing bodies as possible. The Select Committee is parliamentary scrutiny of the government, providing an opportunity for governors (in all state funded schools) to demonstrate the breadth of effective practice that exists, and to suggest any necessary changes. The Committee intends to look at:

- the purpose, roles and responsibilities of school governing bodies, within the wider context of school governance and leadership;
- the implications of recent policy developments for governing bodies and their roles;
- recruiting and developing governors, including the quality of current training provision;
- the structure and membership of governing bodies, including the balance between representation and skills;
- the effectiveness and accountability of governing bodies;
- whether new arrangements are required for the remuneration of governors;
- the relationships between governing bodies and other partners, including local authorities, academy sponsors and trusts, school leaders, and unions; and
- whether changes should be made to current models of governance.

Too often when governance is discussed not enough governors are heard; the NGA urges all its members to submit evidence. You do not need to answer every question but please do respond if you can. B. Education News

1. All Party Parliamentary Group on Governance considers school funding

Parliamentarians will have received an invitation from Neil Carmichael MP, Chair of the All-Party Parliamentary Group for Education Governance and Leadership, to the group's next meeting on **Monday 10 December** at 4.30pm. As MPs have received representations from some governors about the changes to school funding, this is the topic for discussion at this term's APPG. Please do encourage your MP to attend. 2. Ofsted publishes its annual report

On 27 November, Sir Michael Wilshaw, Her Majesty's Chief Inspector (HMCI) produced his first annual report. The annual report is based on the full range of services (schools, early years, childcare services, adult learning and colleges) Ofsted inspects, but is underpinned by additional reports on each of the sectors including schools. Sir Michael opens the report by saying: 'It is important that we remind those who complain about standards today of how low they were in pre-Ofsted days...'. He notes that in order for the English education system to reach the level of the very best in the world it needs strong leadership and that his annual report is 'fundamentally about the importance of leadership at every level.'

The opening to the schools' specific report states that 'Schools in England are getting better', with 70% rated good or outstanding compared to 64% five years ago. HMCI notes that this is still not good enough compared to high performing jurisdictions across the world.

The report is set out in three key sections: how good are schools in England, positive trends and challenges. Although there is not a separate section devoted to governance, in each of the three sections there is mention of the importance of good governance. The report goes defines what it means by a good governing body: "A strong governing body is characterised by a collective ambition for the school to excel. The governors provide a good balance between supporting the school and ensuring that ambitious targets for improvement are set and achieved. They are fully informed and are able to ask challenging questions about the work of the school; thereby holding leaders and managers to account."

In relation to the challenges facing the system, HMCI focuses particularly on two aspects:

- the gaps between the outcomes for the most prosperous and the poorest; and
- the wide variations in the performance of schools across different local authority areas

The report 'names and shames' local authorities, pointing out that in some areas there is a less than 50% chance of children and young people attending a good or outstanding school, compared with more than 90% in other areas.



At the same time as publishing its annual report, Ofsted launched its new tool, Data View, which enables comparisons about outcomes of Ofsted inspections to be made across schools, local authorities and regions.

3. 400 primaries to be converted

On Monday 12 November, at a cabinet meeting held at the John Cabot Academy in Bristol, the Prime Minister, David Cameron, announced that a further 400 of the weakest primary schools will be converted into academies. Mr Cameron said: "We want to go further, faster, with 400 more under-performing primary schools paired up with a sponsor and either open or well on their way to becoming an Academy by the end of next year."

Open to all governing bodies (LA maintained and academies) in England, including non-members.

Outstanding Clerk

Open to all clerks/academy secretaries in England and Wales (Welsh entrants need to apply via <u>Governors Wales</u>), including non-members.

4. Scholarships for chairs' training

The Chair's Development Programme has a RRP of £350, but the National College is providing scholarships for some participants to make the programme as accessible as possible. There are two types: a full scholarship of £350 for participants from small schools (100 pupils or less according to the most recent Pupil Level Annual School Census), or a part scholarship of £175 for participants from schools that are 'satisfactory' or 'require improvement.' There is a limited fund, so apply early to make sure you receive one of these scholarships. You have to apply via your training provider.

For the purpose of this programme, the following state schools and establishments are defined as eligible:

- Community, foundation, VA and VC schools and colleges
- Pupil referral units
- Academies and free schools
- Local authority nurseries

- Secure units
- City technology colleges
- Studio schools
- Non-maintained special school

1. National College

 a. Applications for the next round of NLGs opens on 3 December



Closing date: Tuesday 18 December 2012

National Leaders of Governance (NLGs) are experienced chairs who provide coaching and support for chairs in a school outside their own. The next application round opens on 3 December, and closes on 21 January 2013.

For this application round, the <u>eligibility criteria</u> have been amended so that – by exception – applicants with less than three years' experience, who can demonstrate the impact they have had on improving school performance, will be eligible for designation. The requirements remain for an applicant's school to show consistently high levels of pupil performance or continued improvement; and to have an Ofsted judgement of good or outstanding for both overall effectiveness and leadership and management.

b. Primary associate academies

In association with FASNA (Freedom and Autonomy for Schools National Association), the National College will be deploying a group of 50 primary associate academies, whose job it will be to help primary schools make an informed choice about academy conversion, but



also support them through the process of conversion. They are looking for headteachers, principals, chairs of governors, and school business managers that have led successful conversions and are keen to help others.
